## DOULA AND EXTENSION EDUCATION PROGRAM NEWS

### *March of Dimes Grant Supports Doula Training For Women of Color*

When grant writers proposed a program to train women of color to be doulas, they were talking about women like Virginia Herrera and Sabine Thomas – two women who were already making great contributions to their communities, and were ready to take on new challenges.

Take Sabine Thomas. She's a 29-year-old graduate of Mount Holyoke College, whose family is originally from Haiti. She spent most of her life in Zaire (which in 1997 became the Democratic Republic of the Congo), before coming to the United States 14 years ago. Since 2001, Thomas has worked as a health educator at the Center for MultiCultural Health in Seattle, focusing on prevention of AIDS, tobacco use, and infant mortality.

"I have a weakness to work with teen mothers – partners are not there, families are not supportive," Thomas said.

With the help of a March of Dimes grant, Thomas completed the SMS Labor Support Course in January and the Postpartum Doula Training in March. She is in the process of completing her PALS certification.

While becoming a doula has allowed Thomas to expand her work with underserved communities, it has also had an effect on her own goals for the future. She realized "I could become a midwife and work in public health."

In all, 22 women of color have completed doula training at SMS since last summer. The March of Dimes grant paid for the training of 12 of those women, and the remaining 10 received scholarships from SMS, Pacific Foundation for Childbirth Support, and Seattle/King County Public Health. SMS and its collaborators are seeking funding to continue this program.

"The cool thing is that women are coming to us who have heard about it through their friends," said Annie

Kennedy, Doula and Extension Education Program Director at SMS. "There's a buzz about it."

According to Virginia Herrera, there was a bit of a buzz even before the program took off. She heard through a friend in Spokane that women of color and Spanish speakers were being sought to train as doulas. The 37-year-old mother of two cleans houses and works with Spanish-speaking parents at Head Start. Herrera is originally from Mexico City, and moved to the Seattle area 13 years ago.

Before becoming a doula, Herrera had attended five births to support friends, but said she didn't necessarily feel good about those experiences. She said she lacked the language of advocacy, and didn't know exactly what her friends needed.

Since completing the doula course in May and becoming a member of PALS, she said that her experiences have been much more positive, and she has been spreading the doula word among Latina women – becoming a community doula.

"I think they feel like 'who is this woman,' but later on when they realize that I speak the same language and have the same background, they begin feeling much more comfortable," Herrera said.

That ability to give comfort is a big source of pride for her. "I really helped them, and they feel comfortable with me, and they can have somebody at that difficult time."

## Program Growing to Meet Needs

One of the goals in SMS's new strategic plan is to meet community needs by expanding the Doula and Extension Education Program. We are moving forward rapidly to meet this goal by introducing several new courses.

- We have created a new Breastfeeding Educator Course for aspiring lactation consultants.
- Penny Simkin will teach workshops in Providence, Rhode Island and Seattle, Washington for care providers working with pregnant and birthing survivors of sexual abuse. Penny will be joined for the Seattle workshop by Phyllis Klaus, the co-author of their long-awaited book *When Survivors Give Birth*.
- We are adding two more Labor Support Courses to meet the growing demand. One will be held in Providence, Rhode Island and one in Bellevue, Washington.

We have hired a new Labor Support Course instructor, Carrie Kenner. Carrie is an active doula, doula mentor, and childbirth educator in Seattle. She also serves on the boards of directors of the Pacific Association for Labor Support (PALS) and REACHE.

## *Seniors Head Overseas For Clinical Rotations*

As is often the case this time of year, many senior midwifery students have been heading to exotic places to complete their practicum requirements. In addition, we are excited to announce that we have another preceptor site in place.

Sharon Avolio (Bellingham, WA) loved working with the midwives at Victoria Hospital in St. Lucia during the month of July.

Anne LeBlond (Jaffray, BC) left for Vanuatu in the Fiji Islands in August. We are happy to report that she is coming home early, having accomplished her goals more quickly than anticipated.

Theresa Yankson (Calgary, AB) recently left for a rotation in St. Lucia and will return in October.

Karen Dugan (Seattle, WA) will be the second SMS student to join the African Birth Collective for a three-week rotation in Senegal. Karen will leave in November.

Thanks to a contact provided by freshman Mel Parsons, we have a new site in Davao City on Mindinao Island in the Philippines. Our students can now gain clinical experience at the Mercy Maternity Center, a community birth center. SMS senior, Suzanne Fisher will be the first student to complete a rotation at this new site.

## *SMS Welcomes St. Lucian Midwife*

The SMS Global Midwifery Fund was formed to support sister midwives in those countries where our students have received clinical training. Supported by staff, faculty, students and preceptors, the fund has provided money to purchase much-needed supplies for those clinics we visit.

We are excited to announce that, after two years, we have raised enough money to bring a St. Lucian midwife to Seattle for training in lactation support. Victoria Hospital in St. Lucia is working toward official designation as a Baby-Friendly Hospital. A maternity facility can be designated 'baby-friendly' by the World Health Organization when it does not accept free or low-cost breastmilk substitutes, feeding bottles or teats, and has implemented 10 specific steps to support successful breastfeeding. One of the steps is to train staff to support breastfeeding. In January 2005, SMS is offering its first Breastfeeding Educators Course, and Miss Marcelene Davis from Victoria Hospital will attend. With the generous support of area midwives and SMS staff, we will also be able to provide housing and time with homebirth midwives in the Seattle area. We are working to provide a breast pump to send back to St. Lucia with Miss Marcelene.

## From Calling to Courtroom
